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
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Tim McGee—A Proven Leader

Due to his background, together with his military and business experience, Tim McGee will effectively lead the SMC in 2019. Born in Iowa, Tim was raised in Michigan from the age of 3, instilling in him Midwestern values of caring, respect, honesty and responsibility which he has displayed ever since.

In 1966, upon graduation from University of Detroit Jesuit High School, without informing his parents, Tim enlisted in the Marine Corps at the height of the Vietnam War, because he discerned a call to serve his country. During his 7½ year career, Tim undertook the following duties: Electronic Countermeasures Technician and Operator; Bodyguard and Assistant to Marine Corps Chaplains; and Court Reporter/ Squadron Group Legal Officer. He was accepted into Officer Candidate School but was unable to complete due to a combat injury sustained



in Vietnam. His awards include: Naval Commendation; Naval Achievement with Bronze V; Combat Action Ribbon; Air Crew Wings; Vietnam Service Awards; and Good Conduct Medal. Ever since then, Tim has actively supported the Marine Corps through its Toys for Tots and other charitable ventures with the Marine Corps League.

Following his military service, Tim began a very successful career in the Heavy Duty Transportation Industry as a sales engineer, rising to Director of Marketing and Sales for 30 years at the Budd Company, Hayes Lemmerz and Meritor Heavy Vehicle Systems. After an early retirement, Tim reentered the work force and became the Theater Technical Manager at Bloomfield Hills Andover High School for 8 years. Together with fellow SMC Member Bruce Snyder, Tim staged countless plays and musicals to universal acclaim. Tim auditioned and directed both Danny Gurwin, Sutton and Hunter Foster, former and current Broadway legends, when they were growing up in the Birmingham-Bloomfield area.

Beyond these efforts, Tim has been involved in community theater for over 40 years as an actor, producer, director, stage manager, set designer and board member. He has written two books, *A Community Theater Guide to Stage Managing* for the Village Players of Birmingham and *A History of American Theatrical Drama...An Anthology* for the Troy Historical Society. His love of the theater is only matched by his commitment



Senior Health Matters Age-Related Loss of Memory-Part 2 of 3

Certain areas of thinking do show a normal decline with age but others remain stable.

"Crystallized" intelligence is knowledge or experience accumulated over time. It actually remains stable with age. "Fluid" intelligence or abilities not based on experience or education tend to decline.

Remote memory or recall of past events that have been stored over many years remains relatively preserved in old age. Recent memory or the formation of new memories is more vulnerable to aging.

Simple or focused attention such as the ability to pay attention to a television program tends to be preserved in older age. Difficulty may be encountered when divided attention is required such as trying to pay attention to the television and simultaneously talk on the telephone-multitasking. Verbal abilities including vocabulary are preserved as we age. Common changes have to do with word retrieval or the process of getting words out. It takes longer and is more difficult to find the words one wants when engaged in conversation or trying to remember the names of people and objects. The information is not lost but it is more difficult to retrieve.

Traditional ways of approaching solutions are maintained in older persons. Problems that have not been encountered during your life may take extra time to figure out.

Aging does affect the speed with which cognitive and motor processes are performed. This does not mean that the activities cannot be performed but they take longer.

Senior Health Matters Age-Related Loss of Memory-Part 3 of 3

We now know that certain interventions can sharpen cognitive processes and compensate for or slow-down age related changes.

High stress levels can impair learning and memory. Exercise can be beneficial. Psychologic counseling should be considered.

Maintain good health and control of medical conditions. Arthritis and pain can affect cognitive areas such as concentration and processing speed. Sensory changes such as loss of hearing can interfere with processing of information. Hearing aids may be in order.

Medication may produce drowsiness and mental dullness. Interaction between prescriptions and overthe-counter drugs should be evaluated by letting your doctor know all the medications you are on.

A diet rich in fruits and vegetables containing antioxidants such as blueberries, strawberries and cruciferous vegetables like broccoli is prudent. Certain oils such as olive and canola oil may be protective of the nervous system.

Keep mentally stimulated. Engaging in cognitively challenging tasks can protect against age-related decline in thinking. Examples are playing bridge, reading and adult education classes. All of these are offered by the SMC.

Use active strategies to store new information. Examples are: follow a routine of always putting one's keys in the same place; use a calendar and pill box; and take more time to actively process new information. When introduced to someone, pay extra attention and try to come up with an association to recall the person's name.

When you walk into a room and forget why you entered the room, turn around and walk out. Then re-enter. This "resets" the brain and you will immediately remember what you were looking for.
