Wednesday, July 1 at 10:30 AM: The General the President by H.W. Brands. New York: Penguin Random House, 2016.

This is the fascinating story of the conflict between President Harry Truman and General of the Army Douglas MacArthur which led to MacArthur's controversial removal as commander of American and United Nations forces in Korea during the Korean conflict. It was not only a conflict between two strong-willed leaders, but a classic struggle between the democratically elected civilian leader of a nation and a popular and powerful military general, as well as a struggle over who would control ultimate decision making and ultimate power regarding the nation's military and foreign policy. But as Brands points out, it was even much more than this. It was a struggle over whether or not the United States would embark on a course of action that may well have led to the third world war and the first in which both sides had nuclear capability.

Monday, July 20 at 3:00 PM: Fins: Harley Earl, The Rise of General Motors and the Glory Days of Detroit by William Knoedelseder. New York: Harper Collns, 2018

Harley Earl was credited as being one of the real pioneers of automobile design at time, according to one commentator, "when human beings designed cars". The Los Angeles Times review stated, "Fins is a lively study, as big and broad as one of GM's Buick Roadmasters but as sleek and speedy as one of its Chevrolet Corvettes. It's essential reading for anyone interested in America's auto obsession."

On Monday, July 13, at 1:00 PM, Joel Adelman will present, via Zoom, the 1957 epic war film "Bridge on the River Kwai" (2 hours and 41 minutes), which tells the story about a group of British soldiers in a Japanese POW Camp that build a bridge – as a morale exercise – under the leadership of a British Colonel, played by Alec Guinness, while two other prisoners, played by William Holden and Jack Hawkins, plan to destroy it. A psychological battle of wills combined with high-powered action sequences make this movie a blockbuster. The film was highly praised when released, winning seven Academy Awards, including best picture. It is considered a landmark film and was among the first 100 films selected for preservation in the United States National Film Registry. If iconic war movies telling a great story appeal to you, then this is a film for you to enjoy. Now, in the Zoom era there are two ways in which you can participate in the Classic Movie Group: You can join us at 1:00 PM to watch the film on Zoom, or you can watch the film on your own, using your own resources, and then join us at 3:45 PM for a post-show discussion regarding the film. CORONAVIRUS AND DIABETES MELLITUS

Over 25% of the hospitalized coronavirus patients are diabetics. The risk of complications is worse in early studies especially if diabetes is not well controlled.

Hence, the usefulness of Continuous Glucose Monitoring over 24 hours (referred to as CGM in short) for better control assumes an ever so important role. All these devices do so without having to prick your fingers repeatedly all day!
